Chairman's Review and Reflection for 2019 and beyond – an interesting mixed year!

Annual Report

When I tell folk how many services we have and what we do as a Church, people are both shocked and surprised. Of course, it is only possible because of the great people we have in our midst, who make everything happen. Thank you for the continued support, both financially and through the servant-hearted nature of so many from the All Saints' community. As I have written below, last year (2019) was not however the easiest of years for the country, the Diocese of Salisbury (with the terrible shadow that the poisoning cast in Salisbury itself) or indeed for me personally. However in reflecting on the year it is important to acknowledge the good things that have happened, amidst the upheaval and trauma we have experienced.

2019 – a year to be grateful

As we enter 2020, I have to say I am really encouraged. In recent months especially and during the past year, God has been sending us new people, who want to grow His Kingdom for all ages and stages of faith.

The shock and interruptions to our normal life caused by the Coronavirus outbreak have brought some welcome and unwelcome changes. It has meant some premature distraught deaths and funerals for me to attend to. It has also meant not meeting or seeing people, which has left many hardships, increased loneliness and enforced isolation. Businesses have been left decimated and relationships put under strain. We are, nevertheless, fortunate to have had great weather and a beautiful place in which to live, when so many are confined to flats in larger cities, with little green space.

In March we had to cancel our A.P.C.M, as well as our annual tea party, where we thank our amazing volunteers. On a positive note we have done a fair bit of tidying up of the Churchbox database and adopted new working practices and procedures, as well as enhanced our online offering. In reflecting on the year of 2019 for this annual report, I would like to highlight three areas – Prayer, Politics and Personal life.

Prayer

Whilst we started 2019 with a series on mental health and wellbeing, we began 2020 looking at prayer, using the www.prayercourse.org in our

Evening Encounter group, by Pete Greig. For many months we have been praying for more contemporary worship leaders and musicians to join our Church, whilst still valuing greatly our organist and traditional choir. This year we continued to have Phil Smith, who joined us on a paid basis at the start of 2019, to lead at the Family Service and also at Encounter. We have also been blessed to have Lloyd and Rosemary Griffiths join us, helping to lead both at Encounter and also at the 9.30am Family Service. Now they are also part of a great team putting useful material on our website, during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Politics – decisions made, action to come

2019 was a seismic year in politics. This year we saw an historic Conservative victory, in another election about Europe, followed by the Brexit bill passing through the Commons. Whatever your views on the subject, at least certainty on that front has arrived. More locally this year we also saw the merger of Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole Councils creating the constant promotion of BCP - *the Book of Common Prayer* – BCP wherever you go, you are never far from a van with the BCP logo. It, of course, is the basis upon which the Church of England continues in many regards and I know, whilst the language may at times be odd to the modern ear, BCP remains dear and close to many in our midst.

Personal – cancer

It was a big year for me becoming 50 in March and thanks to all who helped (& attended) making it a wonderful Church celebration in the Hall, especially my wife who organised the whole thing and did an excellent speech. In the summer of 2019, my dear wife noticed a mole that had been on my foot had grown bigger. In part, perhaps because we were both aware of Bob Nurser's cancer, which led to him stepping down as Churchwarden, I decided to get it looked into. Unfortunately, the mole did turn out to be cancerous, which meant further surgery and more enforced rest. I am grateful to all who have looked out for me, covered for my absence, prayed for me and the family, as well as those who have delivered cards, gifts and food to the Vicarage door.

I would also, in this extended year of being a Churchwarden, give particular thanks to Anne Burton. She has been a tower of strength, shown practical Christian kindness in action, with meals and cakes being left frequently but also for carrying the burden of being a Churchwarden on her own for most of her tenure. As we have become accustomed to doing on Thursdays, clapping for our NHS, we need to give Anne a rousing cheer, for continuing to also work in a doctor's surgery.

In addition to all that is in this report we have had in Church:-

- 14 baptisms
- 5 weddings
- 17 funerals
- 6 burials of ashes

He continues to provide assistance in addition to his role as Deputy Treasurer.

In January 2020, after working in the office on a temporary part-time basis, Sasha Pick and Yvonne Wilson were appointed as administrators for a year, after both having worked well together and being formally interviewed.

So once again special thanks to everyone in the office, including John and Jean Parker, who bear a considerable part of the burden in planning and preparing for baptisms, weddings and funerals. Also, I must pay tribute to Eddie and Barri Newcomb who continue to help couples and the Vicar with the increasingly burdensome side of wedding administration. We were scheduled to have 8 weddings in 2020 but with the Coronavirus outbreak we are not quite sure how many will be postponed till 2021 or held at a different date this year. Objectives for 2019 and how we met them

- Renew the vision statement and if appropriate grow and develop the provision and number of discipleship/worship groups in our Church.
Met by a review and publishing of " Vision 2020- Evangelical, Ecumenical and Ecological" on our website and the introduction of a new less formal service in the church hall on Sunday evenings "Encounter".
- Improve security to the church and then ensure that the church is open during the week.
Ongoing discussion on the position of a CCTV camera in church. Meanwhile, the church is now open every weekday morning with volunteer 'mindes' on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
- Look to expand and improve the administrative function to support church activities, the vicar and volunteers.
Much discussion on the subject (see below) and a decision was made by the end of the year. Administrative function expanded and improved by employing two experienced people on a job-share basis, to work for 35 hours per week.

- Complete repairs and cleaning to the south facing windows in the nave and other works following the quinquennial inspection.
Window repairs completed during the year, along with gold leaf work, restoration and painting. Other works being listed in order of priority.
- Promote and expand the new church database.
Much promotion of ChurchBox in the weekly service sheet and elsewhere. Expanding slowly, with over 120 members now sharing their details out of around 200 regular Sunday attendees and nearly 500 on our whole Church database, with 265 on email.
- Explore the removal of 3 or 4 pews to make the church more accessible for children, the elderly and the disabled, subject to consultation with the congregation.
Subject explored but many differing views expressed. No decision taken yet.
- If funds are available, purchase new chairs for the church hall.
Much discussion and testing of samples through the year resulting in a decision, with the purchase of new chairs approved in 2020.
- Undertake training with the new PCC as directed by the Archdeacon.
No formal training has taken place but responsibilities and requirements clearly expressed to new members of the PCC.
- Improve our communications with a new mobile friendly website.
Completed. We now have a much improved website.
- Continue to be environmentally responsible and improve the churchyard, including progressing the memorial garden project.
Much heavy work done in clearing the site and making it more attractive. See separate report.
- Continue to improve the sound system.
Continual improvements have been made but much remains to be done, as and when funds are available.
- Run the Alpha course and other courses supporting our vision.
Many courses have been run successfully, including Alpha, Parenting Children, Bereavement Journey and Relationship (marriage & marriage preparation courses).

- Continue to look at how we use our resources.
This continued throughout the year. The best use of financial and human resources are under constant review.

Other PCC decisions and discussions

The year commenced with a review of the Secretarial and Administration support function in All Saints. This subject was discussed throughout the year culminating in the consideration of a paper written by Peter Drysdale "The Church office: Supporting All Saints Church in 2020 and beyond" at the November 2019 meeting. His recommendations were broadly accepted resulting in the employment, on a job-share basis, of Yvonne and Sasha from 1st January 2020, for an initial period of one year.

At the January 2019 meeting, it was finally agreed to go ahead with the purchase of a defibrillator which we positioned on the outside wall of the church hall. Many thanks to Vicky Moss for persevering with this task and others for seeing it through.

The PCC expressed a sincere vote of thanks for Carolyn Couzens (curate) and the work that she had done at All Saints.

New chairs for the church hall had been a subject for discussion at several meetings. Samples had been tested and varying opinions expressed! Finally, it was agreed to set up a small sub-committee resulting in a decision in late January 2020, with chairs now purchased at the time of writing.

At the short PCC meeting directly following the APCM, the following appointments were proposed, seconded and agreed unanimously:

Vice-Chairman	-	Bob Nurser (later replaced by David Carr)
Treasurer	-	Anthony Ellis
Deputy Churchwarden	-	Beryl Hurley
Deputy Treasurer	-	Peter Drysdale
Secretary	-	Ray Stephenson

It was also agreed to use Spitfire Telecommunications to provide the telephone service in the office as they were cheaper and able to take messages remotely with more functionality than BT.

In mid-year, topics discussed included: window refurbishing, CCTV in church, churchyard memorial garden and church redecoration.

The Vicar's report at the November meeting emphasised our evangelical roots. He cited Alpha courses, house groups, and the other courses that we run, welcoming strangers and those on the fringe. He had previously presented a paper "Vision 2020 – Evangelical, Ecumenical and Ecological"

suggesting that we should have another vision day, or at least a morning, with the new PCC after the 2020 APCM.

We also updated our Safeguarding policy and looked at how we protect the data given to us by Church members.

The Church Representation Rules have been updated and a new 2020 edition promulgated. With regard to the PCC, major changes are:

- Minimum number of PCC meetings in a year not specified.
- PCC may conduct business by correspondence (paper or email).

Western Road and Branksome Park Road Safety

Work has continued with Bournemouth Poole and Christchurch Council and the Branksome Park and Canford Cliffs Residents Association to reduce the speed limit on Western Road and in the Branksome Park area to 20 miles per hour. With the numbers of Church members using this road it is hoped that this reduction will greatly improve safety whilst crossing outside the Church. I am now an active member of the Residents' Association and also part of the team monitoring car speeds in the area.

Deanery Synod (met 3 times)

There were three meetings of the Poole and North Bournemouth Deanery Synod during 2019.

The first was held at Branksome St. Clements church, Poole, on the 6th February, where Ian Bromilow led a talk on stewardship and what that means to us. Ian stated that stewardship was not all about putting your hand in your pockets and that stewardship was a lot deeper than that. We were asked three questions:

- What do we think we mean by stewardship?
- What are the characteristics of a generous church?
- What are the barriers in giving?

The second meeting was held at St Mary's church, Lytchett Matravers on the 21st May, where the Asst. Rural Dean David Price, talked about his experience of growing a church on a new housing estate near Southampton. He suggested the following questions that we could take back to our own churches to consider:

- How have you seen growth in your church?
- Are there inhibitions in church to stop growth?
- What ideas do we have for encouraging growth?

The third meeting was held at Heatherlands St John on 17th October, where the Director of Communications for the Diocese, Carole Peters-King, spoke about communication and best practice. Carole was a very inspirational speaker, stating that Jesus was the best communicator and that none of us would be here today if we hadn't heard the word of Jesus. She said that life today is so busy and that we are losing the skill of communication and don't have the time to spread the word as Jesus would have done. We now have the technology to use to spread the word. A discussion then took place on how this was best done.

APCM Report on the Fabric, goods and ornaments of the church

The most significant work that has been done to the church this past year is the repairs and re-glazing of the south side windows. The Rose Window on the west side will be undertaken, God willing, in 2020.

Last spring the paintwork on the inside of the church was refurbished, including dealing with some minor damp patches and careful redecoration and stencilling of the delicate paintwork.

February this year saw some very severe storms which unfortunately brought down one or two branches in the graveyard. These were dealt with and the areas tidied. Plans are ongoing for the Memorial Garden in the graveyard.

Routine maintenance to the church building, surrounding grounds and the church hall have been carried out as usual, including servicing the boiler, electrical testing and the annual tree survey. Our verger, John Parker, has as always been a great help with his invaluable knowledge of the intricate workings of the Church.

A new projector has been purchased which can be used for both church services and for events in the church hall. Two new laptops have also been purchased for use in the office.

Church Hall Maintenance: Thanks go to **Elaine Le Gonidec** for all her hard work and dedication to the upkeep and running of the church hall. The purchase of new chairs have now been approved and should be arriving in 2020.





Financial Review

The final operating result (unrestricted funds) for 2019 was a disappointing loss of £5,411. Total unrestricted income for the year was £177,419, which is down just over 7.5% from 2018. The decrease can be seen in all income areas, although within this, the fete and garden party hosted by Peter Jackson (with thanks to all those involved) were very successful.

Thankfully, throughout the year we received several generous donations to help reduce the deficit. It should also be noted that instead of making the 2019 gift day about specific donations or increased giving, we decided to make more of a push towards people joining the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS). Sadly, this only resulted in six new applicants. Regular giving is very important to the church, not only for its cash flow but also allowing All Saints to carry out its mission in the best possible way.


Gift Aid claimed for the year came to £27,862 (thanks to the efficient work of John Crowe), illustrating the importance of registering for Gift Aid with All Saints' church.



The total unrestricted expenditure for the year was £182,829, an increase of just over 3%. The increase in our Parish share increased by £4,273 (4.2%). There were several large expenses incurred during 2019 such as the purchase of a defibrillator, redecorating part of the church and the biggest of them all, repairing four of the windows. Thanks to a legacy and some more generous donations, most, but not all of these costs were covered by restricted funds.

If you have not already thought about joining the **Parish Giving Scheme** or giving by Standing Order, it really would help us, if you are able to. At this current time (April 2020), like many other businesses and charities, whilst we have cut our costs (furloughed staff, turned off or turned down the heating and stopped the cleaning of the Church and Church Hall) and reduced overheads, *we are running at a deficit*. Not least because a large proportion of our income has been reduced and we no longer have the cash collections, with the Church being closed at the present time. We do however have some reserves and generous legacies, so we are very blessed. We welcome you thinking of leaving something to All Saints in your will but of course we realise you should put your family needs above us. **Please contact the office, the Treasurer, Deputy Treasurer or the Vicar for more details.**

Bereavement Support Group (BSG)

We have had a busy and interesting year. Many and varied speakers, who have supplied us with very helpful information and pointed people in the right direction for individual needs and support.

We were delighted and privileged that Anna Castley from Church of The Transfiguration was able to speak at the annual "In Loving Memory Service". It was both moving and inspirational, and much appreciated by those in attendance. Her talk is on our website.

The numbers attending the group varied but was always between 15 to over 20. Visitors have enjoyed warmth, care, support and a safe place in which to 'be with their grief', receiving one to one help when needed or requested, and sharing camaraderie with others in the same situation who empathise with their tears and loss.

It is no longer possible to keep this small intimate group, as church groups are open to all and it therefore sometimes needs to be in a larger size hall. The team feel that the altered dynamics of such a group are no longer tenable with what we wish to give the group. The December meeting was happy and harmonious and a good note to end on!

Bereavement Journey Course

We were able to run the course (TBJC) twice over the last twelve month period: March / April 2019 and January / February 2020. Each course had eight guests, which is a good number to have for such a course as this.

Again, feedback from guests was very positive and we are privileged to be able to call upon the help of ten dedicated and experienced volunteers over the two courses. We were able to keep costs down (the food, refreshments and the materials) to a suggested donation of £30 for the six sessions.

The course is lead and hosted by Gill Drysdale, who is a trained counsellor and active Cruse Bereavement counsellor. But the support she has received from Charlie, Eva and the pastoral team has been key to its success. We aim to run the course at least once in the next twelve months.

Finally, we thank the PCC and members of All Saints for their support and prayers. We have been truly blessed by this. We ask for your prayerful support for the year ahead.

Nursery

The year of 2018 to 2019 saw the All Saints' nursery continue to flourish and build upon the success of previous years. The nursery enjoyed being full to capacity for most of the year with staff working extremely hard to continue to maintain the high standards that we set ourselves.

The nursery has had no staff changes during the year and the children have benefited from the highly experienced and dedicated team. The children have enjoyed visits from the fire service, police, RSPB and Creature Teachers. We have continued with our weekly visits to Canford Cliffs Library during the spring and summer term, half termly visits to Chalgrove Care Home and frequent outdoor learning opportunities in the

surrounding woodlands. We have regularly welcomed parents into the nursery to meet each other and to listen to the children singing. Parents have also contributed by sharing their skills and knowledge with all the children. The academic year ended with an amazing Fashion Show titled "Pride and Joy" at which the children showed T shirts, hats and capes that they had created, with props and scenery produced by the parents. They are indeed our Pride and Joy.

The nursery now has a professionally produced and maintained website, which informs prospective and existing parents. Staff development continues to be a high priority. Staff have attended a wide variety of courses in addition to maintaining their statutory First Aid and Safeguarding training.

We have high numbers of children on roll, a stable, experienced and dedicated staff team as well as a committed and experienced board of trustees. We have plans for future developments which include looking at the possibility of an outdoor covered play area (approved by the P.C.C.) and further supporting children's speech and language development.

Wildlife Conservation at All Saints

Throughout the summer we enjoyed the annual wildflower blooms in the borders along the tarmac path. In the winter and spring, the cyclamen, snowdrops, primroses and cowslips along the path to the Bury Memorial have also bloomed. Thanks go to Doreen Milligan for supplementing the cyclamen which the squirrels had stolen. Watch out for other wildflowers in the previously unkempt graves and the poppies in the war graves. Val Kite is experimenting with wildflower matting which we hope will work.



We are now at the end of the contract with BCP Council to treat the Bamboo in the area behind the rhododendron hedge and alongside the Chine. The task will continue but we can already see what a

difference has been made. A wonderfully successful volunteer working party session in October resulted in a great deal of clearance and Peter Saunders has painted and planted up the old tyre making a temporary feature to complement the planting under the fir tree and on the old compost heap.

Because we can see the potential for this area, we have postponed putting up the habitat boxes until the proposed memorial garden is complete. The next steps are:

- engage a builder to turn over the area with a mini digger. This will enable us to hold a working party to pick out more Bamboo roots and sow wildflower seeds for the summer.
- commission a survey to see if the old compost area is unstable and if so, to recommend solutions to stabilize it to support a wide path for disabled access. Gabions, as at Branksome Dene Car Park have been suggested.
- obtain estimates for the design and construction of the new garden.
- apply for Faculties and funding for the above
